

A Compilation of General Voyage Notes

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"CYNOSURE. -- The packet ship Cynosure, 1,350 tons register, Captain Williams, left this port, for New York, on Saturday, the 30th of May, with 775 souls of the Saints on board. The company was organized by President Cannon, who, together with Elders C. W. West, J. M. Kay, J. L. Smith, Jesse N. Smith, B. Young, junior, and others, visited the vessel as she lay in the river. Elder David M. Stuart was appointed president, with Elders John S. Gleason and Willard G. Smith for his counsellors. The following are returning to the home of the Saints in Zion: -- Elder D. M. Stuart, who arrived here in the summer of 1860 and has since been laboring in the Scottish District, over which he presided; Elder John S. Gleason who reached this land a little later in the same year and was president of the Newcastle - on - Tyne District; Elder Willard G. Smith, who landed at this port about the same time and has been presiding over the Cheltenham Conference; and Elder Edward Cliff, who arrived at the same time as Elder Smith and has been laboring as president of the Warwickshire Conference. The following, who were released from their ministerial labors to gather to Zion, were also included in this company: -- Elder Robert Sands, late president of the Glasgow Conference; Elder William Hopwood, late president of Staffordshire Conference; Elder John Gibbs, late president of Pembrokeshire Conference; Elder William H. Pitts, late president of the Land's - End Conference; Elder Alexander Letham, who had been a travelling elder in the Edinburgh Conference, and Elder R. E. Morwick, recently travelling elder in the Liverpool Conference, and Elder W. H. Perkes, from this office."

Reminiscences of Elizabeth Bullock Bissenger



. . . I, Elizabeth Bullock Bissenger, was born on a sailing vessel, *Cynosure* four days out at sea on July 10, 1863. Mother was alone as Father had to attend to some business matters before he could sail. After the ship was out a few days, measles broke out in the company causing twenty-two deaths, among them my little brother, two years old. He was buried in the sea one hour before I was born. When we landed in New York we were met by Grandfather James Bullock and he helped my mother cross the plains to Salt Lake City. . . . [p.58]

When we landed we stayed two days at Castle Garden. There was nine hundred and odds on board ship. We then took train for St. Jo's [Joseph]. While traveling between New York and St. Jo's [Joseph] we were delayed several times. The bridge had been destroyed by the soldiers as the war was raging very strong. Then in 1863 when we arrived at Saint Jo's [Joseph], both boats that was running had just gone up the river, so part of the company had to stop until their return. Myself, wife, and children were amongst that part of the company that had to stop until their return. We stopped there three days, then we took the boat up the Missouri River to a place called Florence in the state of Nebraska.

Another experience on this boat was when one of the crew lifted a trap door in the bottom of the boat and then took a bucket to draw water up from the river. He forgot to replace the door and Thomas Cunningham's smaller brother had become frightened when some mules in a stall nearby started kicking and making a lot of noise. He became excited and fell through the trap door. They stopped the boat and searched but never found a trace of his body. They thought he might have been struck by one of the large wheels on either [p.13] side of the boat.

We had 859 souls on board.

We were tossed about on the ocean in the fog for days. The captain told me he had lost his bearings and when the fog lifted one day, we found our ship in the midst of fourteen icebergs. We sailed close by one of them. It looked like a little island, covered with seabirds, and had it's mountain peaks, canyons, and vales. It appeared lonely with the sun dancing on it's crest. [p.107]

The measles were brought on board and we had fifty Saints down at one time, children and grown people, too. The doctor was a poor excuse. He went around the patients with a bucket of salts and left a big dose for everyone that was sick. I told the captain, "It's a mistake to give opening medicine when the measles are breaking out." "Well, doctor them, yourself," roared he for he was a barboiled, big faced man, grim and untidy, and he gave me a medical book, saying, "Use the medicine I have along for the sailors. That doctor is a drunken sot, and he was put on board to pacify the law. It will not do to quarrel with him for he might give us trouble. The best way is to ignore him, and tend to the measles cases yourself."

I acted accordingly, and got along alright. Seven children were born during the passage, and I married seven couples, so they might have it to say, "We married on the ocean." We had old man Tullage [John Tullidge] with us on board, and I bade him organize a chorus in every ward, and let him preside over them. This proved a great success in passing the time profitably, and kept the restless spirits occupied, while they practiced music. We had concerts every opportunity on deck, and joined all the ward choirs with Tullage conducting. [p.108]


- Law stipulated that a ship could not carry more than two passengers for every five tons of weight
- Required every ship carrying passengers arriving in the U. S. from a foreign port to file a list or manifest of all passengers on the ship with the port authorities
- Immigration into the U. S. had virtually no legal restrictions before 1882

1865 Canadian Passenger Lists

- There are no comprehensive nominal lists of immigrants arriving in Canada before 1865.
- Few such lists have survived.
- Quebec City was first to record all immigrants – 1865
- Border crossing (into U.S.) records from 1895 (St Albans, Vermont Records)
 - Canada and USA established a joint inspection system. Passengers arriving in Canada who intended to go on to United States were inspected by US Officials at the Canadian Port of Arrival, then enumerated on US immigration lists.

About 15 miles from the Canadian border, St. Albans is a research target for genealogists, as European immigrants heading for the United States would sometimes land at Halifax, Nova Scotia or Montreal, then take a train through the border crossing here. The National Archives (NARA) lists for St. Albans cover the period 1895-1954.




