## Reading the Newspaper

- · Pre-digital typesetting
  - We have to read the originals or copies (usually on microfilm) with our eyes, or
  - We have to read OCR transcriptions
- With digital typesetting
  - We can read the digital versions
- What is OCR? (Optical Character Recognition)
  - Computer software that attempts to read and transcribe the text

## How does OCR work?

- Two distinct methods
  - Matrix matching: each character is compared to a database of known patterns or shapes and assigned the correct character code
    - The fastest method (24 words per min.)
  - Feature extraction: each character is analyzed for general features, such as open areas, closed shapes, diagonal lines, line intersections, etc
    - · Used for specialty fonts or handwriting

# Searching Newspapers

- Newspapers are scanned page by page and transcribed using OCR technology
- The transcriptions are loaded into an "everyword index" (almost every word)
- The index is searchable by a "search engine"
- The quality and clarity of the image is critical



# The shear volume of newsprint is enormous!

- Not all newspapers have survived
- We do not know where some a located
- Many newspapers reserve their archives for generating revenue
- The expense of maintaining repositories is too much

in August, 1835, constituted the Incorporation of the Cosford Hundred.

That throughout the spring of 1835, the evils arising out of the old system of rolled had grown-up to an abstraing height. The Incorporated workhouse was then tenanted by many able-bodied paupers, who refused to do say kind of work, and defied, by turbulent insubordination, both the rules of the house said the power of the Magistrates. They broke all the windows within reach of their missiles; destroyed window-frames, doors, and door-frames; kept open apertures in the partition and outer walls of the workhouse; beat the governor, &c.

From the disposition thus manifested by the paupers within the house, and shared by those without, it was quite evident there was a design to demolab the workhouse, in order that thenceforward parochial rolled might entirely cesse to be measured by the necessity of the poor, but he yielded to lawless intimidation.

That in this state of hings the acting Directors and Giardians, as well as the Magistrates of the Hundred, appealed earnestly to the Poor-law Commissioners for advice and assistance.

The Directors and Guardians, in utter hopelessness of being able, by any application of the powers granted tiem by the Acts of Incorporation to re-catablish order, and to guard against the danger which seemed to menace the security of persons and property, in conjuction with the rule-payers of the Hundred qualified to serve as Guardians, petitioned the Poor-law Commissioners to dissolve the hoor-poration, and to extend to them the unrestricted benefits of their power and co-operation.

That, in compliance with such application, the Poor-law Commissioners dissolved the incorporation, and formed the Cosford Union, with an addition of ten parishes, the pepulation of the new union being more than double that of the disincerporated Hundred.

That barely fifteen mosths have transpired since the new measures came into operation, yet the success which has attended them has in every respect been such as to excite the surprise and admiration of all who have had an opportunity of appreciating the charge.

The management of, the workhouse is now conducted with regolarity and decorum. Profigacy and idicess and insolence among the poor have been replaced by sobriety, industry, and civility. Not only the paupers themselves, but the lubourcer above that class, and persons still further removed from want, have become in a marked degree more frugal and prudent. # Ogdenite Helps Set Record in Repairs

T/Sgt. Robert W. Rands, son of Corp. Oswin P. Rands, and husband of Lorraine Randall Rands, 1437 Grant, has won high commendation for helping to shatter the world's record in overhauling aircraft engines at an air service command depot somewhere in England.

He and his fellow mechanics overhauled engines last month totaling two and a half million horsepower, the highest figure recorded since air service command began operations in England.
